I worked for the Deer Initiative for 22 years as a deer management advisor covering the West Midlands and Wales and occasionally all over the UK carrying out endless woodland impact surveys, training deer stalkers to successfully pass their level 1 competence certificate, shooting skills, talks and cooking demonstrations of venison all over the UK.

Attached is a photograph my son Paul took of a Long Haired Fallow in the wood at the rear of my house. (See page 2)

Few people are aware of these unique deer as the Mortimer Forest is the only known place in the world where they exist. Reading university carried out several years' work studying them and eventually concluded that they were not a sub-species as first thought but a genetic freak.

If it was felt of interest I would gladly deliver a presentation on wild deer in the UK at some point.

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CHURCH MATTERS



Pray for peace and reconciliation

As I write this in May we have just had the 80th anniversary of VE day celebrations on 8 May, however as the daughter of a woman who was born in Jersey and lived through the German occupation of the island, my thoughts were very much on the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Channel Islands. I thought a lot about my mother and some of the things that she told me about her experiences of the occupation. One story that I always recall was of her telling me that as a 4- year-old child walking with her grandfather around St Helier harbour, the area was strafed by Luftwaffe aircraft. Thankfully she survived the experience, but the trauma of it stayed with her for the rest of her life, as I witnessed when many years later on holiday on Jersey she experienced a panic attack whilst visiting an exhibition which recreated the scene from that day with loud bangs and flashing lights.

Whenever I think of what happened to my mother, I think of the many children who are experiencing the horror of war today and the trauma that will stay with them for the rest of their lives. The trauma of physical injury, the trauma of extreme fear, the trauma of losing loved ones, especially parents, the trauma of homelessness, disease and starvation. Children in a war setting are true innocents, they have no say in the politics that lead to war and they are powerless to end it and yet they are often the ones who suffer the most.

I ask myself what can I do about this? I can give money to charities who are sending aid to refugees in war torn areas, sign petitions and boycott goods from countries which are waging war, but often I feel that this is not enough and that I am powerless to make a difference. In these times I realise that the most important thing I can do is to pray and to keep praying for those who are suffering as a result of war, to pray for peace and reconciliation and to pray that those with the power to end war will do so. I also ask God to give me the strength to have forgiveness in my heart, as true peace and reconciliation only come when both sides are able to forgive each other.

One thing I do remember of my late mother was the fact that I never recall her ever being resentful towards German people. It is ok to hate the bad things that some people may do, but it is better not to let that lead us to hate others.

Almighty God, who through your prophets foretold a day when swords will be beaten into plowshares and who in Jesus Christ made peace through the blood of the cross, pour out your Spirit on all people everywhere so that we may be delivered from hate, hostility, and self-seeking, and find our peace in your will. In your mercy make us instruments of your peace, that your name may be hallowed, your kingdom come, and your will be done on earth as it is in heaven, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

'The Inspector Calls'

St Leonard's Church and Bell Tower were the subject of their five year (quinquennial) inspection in early December last year and we have just received the full report. The intention of the inspection is to report on the state of the buildings and to recommend phased steps for ongoing repairs and maintenance over the next five years. The overall summary of the general condition of our two historical gems was

'The Church is generally in fair condition but repairs are required in order to prevent the fabric from deterioration. The main items of concern are the rainwater goods and the masonry. Both of these elements will require attention within the quinquennium. In the longer term, the Tower will need reroofing and the opportunity should be taken to carry out repairs and repointing of the masonry at the same time'.

Our church and Bell Tower are standing up to the tests of time well overall and, given that they are part of a thriving community hub as well as a place of worship, they experience more wear and tear than many of their compatriots in other villages. Our current range of exhibitions and the increased number of visitors is testament to the hard work of numerous volunteers in celebrating the church and Bell Tower's many qualities. I observed three visitors talking about the Bell Tower recently and as they entered into the tower, with its stunning new exhibition; one lady's response was 'Oh Wow! This is amazing!' So well done to everyone over the years for looking after this unique historical gem – the tenth oldest wooden structure in England. All that said, the inspector's report (all 43 pages) has listed a a range of minor repairs, major works and ongoing maintenance that will be needed over the next 5 years. SLM has estimated that such works will require upwards of £90,000 over 5 years to move the condition of our two buildings from a fair condition to good overall. Our trustee, Stefano Street, has oversight of the maintenance and repair of both buildings so he will be as busy as ever working with volunteers and contractors in the coming 5 years. Rest assured, all the trustees are continuing to do all they can to secure grants from key organisations and charities to raise funds towards these necessary works. As important is the continuing success of our brilliant Gallery Café as its proceeds provide 40% of our running costs each year. It looks a daunting task but when the going gets tough and the Yarpole community is renowned for its commitment to protecting our heritage and building its future.

Yarpole Group Parish Council

On 6 May, the Parish Council held both its annual and scheduled meetings, marking the start of a new civic year with updates, elections, and forward planning. Cllr Ian Salmon was elected Chairman, and Cllr Duncan Grant was appointed Vice Chairman.

Residents are warmly invited to attend upcoming Parish Council meetings, which will take place at 7pm on the first Tuesday of each month. There are no *scheduled* meetings in August 2025 or January 2026. The dates are: 2025: 3 June, 1 July, 2 September, 7 October, 4 November, 2 December and in 2026: 3 February, 3 March, 7 April, 5 May (Annual Meeting of the Parish Council).

The Council approved and signed the Annual Governance and Accountability Return for 2024–2025. This will now be submitted to the external auditor, PKF Littlejohn LLP. An unaudited version will be available on the parish website before the end of June, with the Notice of Conclusion of Audit due by 1 October 2025.

A single planning application was reviewed: P250864/L – Listed Building Consent for Home Farm Croft (Threshing Barn & Machine House), HR6 9PW. The proposal includes repairs to storm-damaged 18th-century agricultural buildings. The Council voted to support the application.

Flood reports concerning Yarpole Lane submitted by Cllr Hill will be passed to Herefordshire Council, Cllr Dan Hurcomb, and the Luston Group Parish Council clerk.

Concerns were raised over erosion and silt build-up along the stream adjacent to the C1039. The risk of further damage will be highlighted to householders. The roadside bank will be reported to Balfour Beatty as it is being damaged by heavy vehicles.

Letters will be sent to residents regarding hedge maintenance on Green Lane, and Balfour Beatty asked to confirm hedge ownership and assist with hedge cutting at Green Lane Crescent.

A new Parish Notice Board for Bircher will be ordered to match those at Bircher Common and Lucton.

The Lengthsman contract with Herefordshire Council for 2025/26 was approved.

The Public Rights of Way Officer recently received training and equipment from Herefordshire Council. These tools will be added to the Asset Register, with ongoing discussions regarding provision of additional personal protective equipment.

Community Meadow. The Council opted not to purchase additional play or exercise equipment at this time. Improvements have been made to the car park entrance, and mowing of the path will be closely monitored. Future path surfacing options will be discussed in 2026. It was agreed that the gate should be kept open, locked to a new gatepost. Signage for Brook Lane warning of children playing will be explored. Other decisions included additional protection against rabbit damage for young trees; white lining of parking bays and weed suppression work; purchase and installation of two Earth Anchors (to stabilise a bench) and a new gate post. Quotes will be sought for a gazebo, and the Clerk will investigate planning requirements.

Discussions with Herefordshire Council will take place regarding signs for Lucton, two "No Parking – Passing Place Only" notices, one near the telephone box and one in Church Road.

The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled for **3 June 2024** at **7pm**, to be held at Yarpole Parish Hall. Residents are encouraged to attend.

News from our County Councillor

I am writing this at the conclusion of a week of activity across Bircher Ward, Herefordshire and the wider country to mark VE Day. I have been amazed at the number of events in every parish and although I have not been able to make as many as I would have liked I have attended where I can. Last month I received reports that, although the timetable had been restored, the buses were still disrupted and I have had assurances this is no longer the case and the full timetable is running smoothly (apart from the odd unavoidable sickness, breakdown or delay). If you have experienced otherwise then please do let me know using the details below.


As I write this, the road resurfacing works on the B4361 near Luston are coming to an end and what a difference it has made! Whilst the fresh tarmac and smooth surface are clearly the best bit, I have spent some time on site looking at the drainage works completed at the same time. I am pleased to report, ditches have been dug properly, gullies rediscovered and cleared out, new drains installed and lost pipework reconnected. All of this together should make the world of difference. I only wish these assets had been maintained properly in the first place and then perhaps we wouldn't have had to have the road resurfaced! The next stop for the tarmac lorries will be Kingsland and you are likely to see disruption in parts of the county so please do check your routes before you travel.

You may have seen the recent news that Herefordshire Council is introducing a Food Waste and Garden Waste Service from May 2026. This is a legal requirement under the Environment Act and we are hoping that government funding will be forthcoming to deliver the Food Waste Service. The Garden Waste Service on the other hand will be funded by individuals who subscribe (much like the current Biffa Brown Bin Service locally) and the initial rate will be set at around £20 cheaper than the commercial alternative. It is the Council's intention that this service will reach more residents than the current one. If you would like further information then please let me know.

On a final note and on a personal level, I would like to thank the wonderful staff at Hereford Hospital. At the end of April I lost my Grandfather shortly before his 91st birthday and whilst he had been ill for some time, the care he received in his final days was truly heart-warming. If you are reading this and you work in the NHS or have a family member that does – thank you!

MORTIMER MEDICAL PRACTICE

Patients' Participation Group (PPG) June 2025

The practice is now able, with the help of a charity, to send medication that patients no longer require, to Ukraine. The medication has to be in its original blister pack or bottle, in date and unused. If anyone has any unused medication it can be delivered to the dispensary; ask for it to be given to Gene.

Missed appointments are still causing problems. From January to April 460 appointments that had been booked were not attended. This is roughly 9 days of clinic time. There is at present a 3-week wait for non-urgent appointments but urgent appointments will always be prioritised. The practice asks patients to inform them if their contact details change as a text is usually sent the day before appointments are due as a reminder. They also realise not everyone has a mobile phone.

Protected Training afternoons 2025 will be from 12.30 pm on Thursday 10 July and Tuesday 14 October. Surgeries will re-open as normal the following day. A GP and receptionist will be available for emergencies; the dispensaries will also close at 12.30 on those days. So please plan ahead if prescriptions need to be collected.

All three dispensaries are facing many challenges at the moment with staffing, recruitment and medication suppliers. The practice is looking at additional roles within the department and at Kingsland they are trialling a counter assistant. A new dispenser started on 1 May.

The practice asks patients to be understanding during this difficult period.

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

No Dig Gardening

On 29th April ODGC welcomed Stephanie Hafferty, a leading authority on 'no dig' gardening, who has grown her own produce for over thirty years and worked as a professional 'no dig' kitchen gardener and designer for over fifteen.

'No dig' is not a new concept, it has its roots in cultures across the globe but has gained more converts in the UK as our knowledge of soil increases. Initially it was thought that deep digging was required to aerate the soil, now it is realised that chopping and mixing soil layers destroys beneficial organisms such as mycorrhiza and also releases carbon into the atmosphere. Applying a thick mulch reduces the need to weed as digging brings weed seeds to the surface and an undisturbed soil sequesters carbon.

Stephanie moved to her present home four years ago and set about making her kitchen garden from an area of lawn. This was mown closely and covered with a layer of overlapping cardboard which was well watered and covered with a thick layer of compost. Bark paths were laid between the beds. A mulch is applied once annually.

Many materials make suitable mulches, depending on what is being grown. Vegetables benefit from well-rotted garden compost or farmyard manure from a source uncontaminated by harmful chemicals. 'Chop and drop' vegetation such as nettle and comfrey is suitable for more robust woody plants but would attract slugs to delicate seedlings. Green manure makes an easy and cheap mulch; mustard, buckwheat and phacelia will increase biodiversity and shade the soil as well as protecting against erosion. Intercropping with rapidly maturing crops such as spinach, salads and radishes increases what can be grown.

Stephanie has a greenhouse and a polytunnel so that she can harvest year round. Cloches and mini-greenhouses within the polytunnel provide a warmer micro-climate.

Clearly 'no dig' is a beneficial concept both to the soil and to gardeners' aching backs.

THE CURIOUS GARDENER

The Great Illusionist

Last month, while visiting a garden in North Yorkshire, we saw a plant that we used to grow years ago but haven't seen for ages. It used to be a great favourite of ours, with so much of interest: exquisite stems, magnificent foliage, astonishing flowers — and an unbelievable smell. It was Dracunculus vulgaris, the Dragon Arum.

Once seen, this plant isn't easily forgotten. It's a bulb that throws up a three-foot-high stem in spring, spotted and streaked with purple. The lobed leaves are 12" or more wide, and are strikingly splashed with silver. But it's the flower that will knock your socks off: a dark red spathe, anything up to 2'6" long, with an evil-looking, black, shiny spadix sticking up from the centre. The texture of the flower is like dark velvet, and the edges are slightly puckered.



The really interesting thing about it is its pollination method. It's pollinated by flies, and what do flies like best? Rotting meat, in which they can lay their eggs. So the Dragon Arum, as well as designing its flower to look like flesh, gives off the unbelievable stench of a corpse, attracting flies in great numbers. Amazingly, the plant completes the illusion by warming up the base of its flower, imitating the heat that accompanies putrefaction. The flies crawl down to the warm, stinking flower base hoping to lay their eggs. They don't find what they're looking for so they crawl out again and fly away, sadder and wiser flies, but while down there they pollinate the plant, which is what the illusion is all about.

It looks like something from a disturbing fairy story and the smell is something else. Although it's native to Greece, it's perfectly hardy in the UK. If you want a real talking point in the garden, you can buy bulbs from bulb merchants in the autumn. Just don't plant it too near a window!

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Bus News

Good news for Yarpole bus users, and in general for North Herefordshire passengers, as Sargeants Brothers have reinstated all the suspended bus services. This included missing buses on the 490 bus route between Leominster and Ludlow. This means Yarpole has 3 buses passing through on weekdays. 7.54 am and 9.34 am to Leominster and 3.01 pm towards Ludlow. (Other chances to board or alight from a bus at Bircher Turn are available!)

One of the most useful buses for a trip to Leominster is the 489 passing at 9.11 am and returning at 12 midday on Tuesdays and Fridays only. Bus passes can be used on this bus before 9.30.

On Friday 13th June we are planning a stroll round Leominster to appreciate the historic buildings travelling on the 489 and would love people to join us. Meet at 9.05 at St. Leonard's.

Sadly only 13 people responded to Pete Lloyd's recent appeal for people to register their interest in using and hopefully improving Yarpole bus services. An older resident wrote him an email including the phrases "Are people so short sighted that they cannot see the value of a reliable bus service?" "Perhaps they are complacent about their health? You'd think that anyone of retirement age (most of Yarpole!) would have considered the possibility of not being able to use a car." I know of only about 8 people who use the buses regularly.

This is therefore a call for everyone to make an effort to occasionally use the bus services because with increased usage an argument could be made for routing more buses through Yarpole.

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News from the Leominster Area Branch

Green Mapping

The Leominster branch of the Herefordshire Wildlife Trust is actively involved with local application of the Government's Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS) which states that existing wildlife sites should be bigger, better, and more joined up!

We are starting to survey the green patches within the Leominster area and will feed in this information. 


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The Day I Nearly Died

'Fancy coming for a sail?' a friend asked, 'across the Channel.' It was something I'd never done, so of course yes. We'd already pootled around bits of the Cornish coast in his 25-foot yacht, but he had ambition. He had been to evening classes, studying for a Master's Certificate, to prove that he knew all about winds, tides, navigation by the stars, and how to cook bacon and eggs on a tiny stove in choppy seas.

The exam vessel was a wooden ship around 70 feet long, more a galleon really, skippered by the teacher, who actually looked more like a pirate, but I suppose that comes with the territory. The group, about a dozen of us, set off from the Hamble, a stretch of water near Southampton, heading for Alderney in the Channel Islands: round the Isle of Wight, then straight across, can't miss it.

We enjoyed a leisurely lunch on Alderney, interrupted only by the skipper suddenly saying 'We've got to leave NOW, there's a storm coming!' So we did. The plan was to get back to the Hamble before bad weather moved in, and before dark; and as a plan, it had much to recommend it. The trouble was, we hadn't even reached the IOW before the wind whipped up, waves followed suit, and we found ourselves in a Force 9 (severe gale), with wind and rain speeds of 50mph, a roiling menacing sea with 30 foot-high waves, and lots of terrifying noise we could have done without.

The thing with a sailing ship, you probably know, is to make sure that, in such conditions, all the sails are down, otherwise the ship will get blown over on its side. Unfortunately, the pirate who was running the show neglected to do this, so we very soon keeled over at a frightening angle and couldn't make what you might call progress. And all the safety harnesses in the world would have been no use if you tried to haul in the heavy wet sails at this stage. By now it was getting dark.

At that point, someone shouted that a fire had broken out below deck. I ask you! My first thought, as a landlubber, was 'Not a problem. The water will put the fire out. It'll be fine.' My second thought was 'Aaaarrrgh! What if it spreads and we all have to jump overboard into these mountainous, green, white-foamed waves that throw our stomachs up in the sky one moment and down into the depths the next?' It didn't spread, but it was some kind of electrical fire, which knocked out the electronic navigation and all the lights. So there was no way of steering the thing, and we couldn't see where we were going in any case, except momentarily when the lightning flashed. The choice seemed to be to either just sink, or crash into the rocks and then sink.

As you may have guessed by now, I didn't die, none of us did. The storm eventually moderated to Force 6 or 7, which seemed quite calm, and we tied up just before midnight. It had taken longer to get round the IOW than it had to sail the 85 miles from Alderney. The sailors were all late for work next day, but they all got their Certificates.

Those were the days....

A while ago, Audrey Bott kindly loaned me some back copies of the Yarpole Parish Newsletter, stretching back to 1992, coincidentally, the same time Gill and I first came to live in Herefordshire. I thought it might be interesting to have an occasional column in today's *Parishioner*, looking back to the early days of the newsletter, starting with the issue of 30 years ago. To put this in context, Tony Blair was prime minster at the time and Unchained Melody/White Cliffs of Dover by Robson and Jerome was number 1 in the charts.

The Newsletter for June 1995 opened with an adage:

June damp and warm
Does the farmer no harm

There were congratulations to the oldest Parishioner, Marian Behr, of Bircher Common, who had celebrated her 102nd birthday on 22nd May. After an early life of travel while in service, she moved first to Yarpole, to Dingledale, opposite the Bell, and then back to Bircher where she lived with her son and daughter-in-law, Michael and Georgie Behr.

There was a coffee morning in aid of the Cobalt Unit Appeal Fund, presumably for a new scanner, while we were invited to venture to Lucton School to Watch the Zagreb Guitar Trio 'Direct from Croatia', and probably glad to escape from that war-ravaged region.

Amazingly, the Orleton and District Gardening Club was already thriving and hosting a Rose and Sweet Pea show. Judging was 'by members', and doubtless hotly contested.

There were excerpts from the funeral address of Albert Niblett, father of David, of Brook House Farm, while, on a happier note, the Yarpole WI were to take a coach excursion to Llangollen, with a combined boat and train trip, all for £7. The Yarpole Playgroup was fundraising through a cake stall in Leominster's Corn Square and a sports day was+ to be held in Eileen Thompson's garden, now divided between Ryelands and Oldfield.

The big fund-raising event of the month, however, was the St. Leonard's Country Fayre, held over two days from 17-18 June. The appeal was already out for gifts of plants, preserves, sweets and crafts. Several village gardens were to be opened and there were homemade teas and a raffle (of course!). Meanwhile, Richard Fletcher and Andrew Thompson were appealing for people to help maintain the churchyard. (Some things never change!)

Under 16s were encouraged to bring plants to the Eye Church flower festival, everyone taking part to receive a certificate. Those not involved could anyway enjoy the balloon race.

The newsletter closed with this final message from the Vicar, Jen Pollock: "May the Holy Spirit be among us and may it free us to love and serve one another in this place."

Yarpole 30 years ago, a caring, thriving, bustling community then, as now.
